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NARUTO: The Symphonic Experience coming to town

There's a common misconception that the symphony is a stuffy, buttonedup affair. The NARUTO: The Symphonic Experience is equal parts anime and rock concert with a sweeping score that brings the beloved characters to life on a grand scale.

The two-hour event features a film montage of iconic scenes from over 220 episodes, synchronized to a live orchestra performing Toshio Masuda's original score. Fans will relive Naruto Uzumaki's journey to become Hokage, facing rivalries, challenges, and growth along the way.

NARUTO: The Symphonic Experience is presented by the FSCJ Artist Series at 7 p.m. Sunday, May 4 in the Moran Theatre at the Jacksonville Center for Performing Arts, 300 W. Water Street, Jacksonville. Tickets are available at www.fscjartistseries.org.

The orchestra performs not only Masuda's unforgettable soundtrack but also the series' most famous openings and endings, inviting the audience to sing along with the music they love. This interactive element draws fans closer

to Naruto, celebrating the powerful, shared bond the music creates.

This event is truly exclusive: the film and musical montage created for NA-RUTO: The Symphonic Experience can only be seen at these shows. Unlike traditional symphony events, audience participation is encouraged. Fans can sing, laugh, cheer, and feel the excitement of seeing their favorite characters on screen, experiencing the full range of emotions that Naruto inspires.

"This is the very first time people have been able to hear this music live with the accompanying picture. Even though the name says symphonic experience, it's not that traditional symphony experience where you have to know when to clap, when to emote," said the event's Associate Conductor Heidi Joosten.

"I think the whole sit still and only golf clap when you are able to came about with the recording age. We want people to treat it like a concert. If something makes them excited, we encourage people to clap and to cheer and be a part of it the same way that we're a part of it. If you know the song, come on and sing along. We're

here to bring the joy of Naruto across the country."

With Masuda's dynamic soundtrack, blending rock, pop, and traditional Japanese instruments like the Shakuhachi and Shamisen, the live music elevates each scene's impact, immersing the audience in Naruto's

"This particular score is just so rich. It really encapsulates all of the emotions we're feeling when we're watching on stage," said Joosten. "The music underneath the fight sequences is so cool, and then is contrasted so well orchestrally with these beautiful, bombastic moments when we see the villain, or if there's a scene that's sad and sorrowful, it's these gorgeous piano themes. It's truly been a treat to deep dive and see what has worked and what has made this music so timeless over the last 20 years."

Joosten is a Jeff-Awardwinning music director, orchestrator, composer, multi-instrumentalist, vocalist, and teacher. Since 2014, she has collaborated on over 125 new theatrical, comedic, and concert productions, including Barbie: Live in Concert at the Hollvwood Bowl, Avatar: The

Last Airbender in Concert, Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse, Grease, Beauty and the Beast, and American Psycho.

As a prolific classical and educational composer, Joosten's works have been performed across the United States, Canada, Europe, and Australia. Her theatrical writing credits include "The Bone Harp," "Queer Eye: The Musical Parody" which had a successful 13-week run at the famed Second City, "Micro", and "Sain Hildegard." Joosten holds degrees in composition from UW-Eau Claire and CCPA, and is a member of ASCAP and the Dramatists Guild.

"If I'm in front of an orchestra conducting, my job is to help give the orchestra members everything they need to create the sound that they need, and that's exactly the same thing here," said Joosten.

"I'm definitely having more fun because the music is so current. I think I'm allowed to have a little more fun with this because it is like rock 'n roll music. It has that pop-rock element to it. I'm dancing to it and having a great time getting to watch some of the greatest musicians I've ever worked with that have become my friends perform this music every single night. I definitely have the best seat in the house on the podium."
